In addition, we will allow for any member who is not comfortable entering the building to complete a ballot in their car during the service hours. In these unparalleled times, we believe such an adjustment satisfies the bylaws of the church while respecting the need to provide a safe environment for every individual to express their opinion. Regardless of the final decision, we are planning for a complete schedule of church ministries to resume on Sunday, October 4. Ultimately, there is no right or wrong decision. We simply believe that the church should be responsible for how we move forward. Join me in praying that the Lord will unify us in what that looks like.

These are the words of the Apostle Paul in Romans 12:15 describing how a follower of Jesus should respond in a time joy and in a time of grief. As I will have attended three memorials by the end of this week, I wanted to give some personal application in how to live out the command to "weep with those who weep" as death is a reality for all of us and is an opportunity to be the body of Christ in a trying time. Following the funeral of a church member, friend or distant relative, we often go back to our everyday lives after we leave the cemetery. However, that is not the case for the one who has lost a loved one. I want to remind you to not forget the reality of the grieving individual who is having to navigate how to live life without the presence of that loved one. To begin, count out 4 weeks beginning the day you left the cemetery. For each of those weeks beginning the week after the funeral, do something as a way to let the person know you are thinking of them, praying for them, and care about them. For example, send a text with a prayer. I have begun to do this and it goes a long way in letting the person know you care. Drop a postcard in the mail letting them know they are in your thoughts and prayers or pick up the phone and call saying very simply, "I want to pray with you today." While none of these suggestions are hard to do, they go a long way in expressing care and love as we learn how to "weep with those who weep being the body of Christ God has called us to be.
